Young women are demanding to be heard this federal election

Young women across Australia are demanding a focus on women's policy issues during this federal election campaign, according to the country's largest national feminist organisation – YWCA Australia.

"This federal election, the most important issue to me is that young women are heard during the election process and adequately represented afterwards at all levels," says Georgina Morphett, member of YWCA Australia's Young Women's Council.

Ms Morphett joins other young women this week at #SHEvotes in Adelaide, YWCA Australia's premier election forum focusing on the impact of policy on women.

"We're often not represented in senior leadership positions or other positions of power. Housing affordability, women's safety and access to women's healthcare are serious ongoing concerns, as well as equitable pay," says Ms Morphett.

Millennials are now Australia's largest voting cohort – growing by 30,000 every year. The issues that concern young women could be the issues that decide the upcoming federal election.

YWCA Australia's 2019 Election Platform will be released as part of #SHEvotes along with a social media video series highlight the election issues that matter to young women.

"This election, we're calling for urgent funding to support women's housing and investment in programs relating to primary prevention of gender-based violence," says CEO Michelle Phillips.

"Access to safe, affordable and appropriate housing is a feminist issue. Family violence, part-time and casual employment, and family care duties often leave women, especially older women, at an economic disadvantage and at risk of homelessness."

"Similarly, women need to feel safe in the world they live in. Violence against women is a social issue, one that needs to be addressed with primary prevention programs that change the structures, norms and practices that drive gender-based violence," says Ms Phillips.

These are among the many issues that Ms Morphett expects will be brought up by young women like herself at the #SHEvotes event on Wednesday in Adelaide.

"As a group, we're passionate about influencing the world that we live in. We want affordable housing, education and healthcare, representation at the highest levels of government, and, mostly importantly, to feel safe."
